Adders emerge from hibernation and bask

on bare ground and sunny spots to warm up. You may find them on quiet paths. Adders mating.

Young **adders** around and about.

Aug

Adders hibernate in holes in the ground. Please ensure your dog doesn't accidently disturb one by keeping them on a lead and close to you.

Sep

Deer are born

Deer rutting season

Bird Nesting Season

Woodlarks and nightjars are ground nesting birds. You won't see them as they are wonderfully camouflaged but your dog could easily disturb them.

This is why dogs MUST be on a lead March to August on the heathland.

Cannock Chase is at its busiest.

Please remember not everyone welcomes being approached by dogs.

Often other dogs don't like it either!

Dogs don't need to be on a lead from November to January, as long as they have excellent recall and you can see what they are doing. Please carry one just incase.

Protect your dog from being bitten by an adder by keeping it close to you.

Cannock Chase is a great place for you and your dog to enjoy. Please follow these steps when you visit.

Why pick up poo?

Heathland soil is typically acidic and low in nutrients, dog mess changes this and heathland plants will not grow.

Do your bit, bag it and bin it at home please.



It is a legal requirement that dogs must be on a lead from the 1st March to the 31st July on Open Access Land (most of Cannock Chase), and at all times around livestock.



Be considerate

Not everyone loves dogs, not even other dogs! Keep your dog close to you and only allow them to approach others after checking it is ok first.

What is 'Under Control'?

Keeping your dog under control means within sight and able to call to heel the first time.

What to do if an adder bites your dog

- You will notice an immediate swelling.
- You might be able to spot two small puncture wounds at the centre of the bite.
- Take your dog to a **vet** immediately.
- Bathe the wound in cold water.
- If possible, carry your dog.
- Keep your dog warm, calm and as still as possible.



Why aren't there poo bins?

It isn't only people who visit our car parks, bins of any type take a lot to look after and present a hazard to wildlife.
